## Alto High School Parent and Family Engagement Policy



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Alto High School is dedicated and fully committed to the academic and social successes of all students enrolled in our district. We firmly believe that parent engagement is an essential piece of the educational process and is a vital component for their students' academic growth and future accomplishments.

 In support of strengthening student academic achievement, Alto High School will reach out to all parents and family members and implement programs, activities, and procedures for the involvement of parents and family members in programs consistent with the requirements of Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), Section 1116. Alto High School will work to ensure that the required school-level

 Parents will be provided the opportunity to attend or receive information by participating in the following: STAAR Curriculum Nights, Written Documentation, and Parent-Teacher Conferences/Meetings. • Alto High School will, with assistance from its schools, provide materials and training to help parents with their children to improve their children's academic achievement, such as literacy training and using technology, as appropriate, to foster parental involvement by: providing necessary training for parents from Title I, Part A funds, if the school district has exhausted all other reasonably available sources of funding for that training; pay for reasonable and necessary expenses associated with parental involvement activities, including transportation and child care costs, to enable parents to participate in school related meetings and training sessions; training parents to enhance the involvement of other parents.

• All written communication will be provided in English and Spanish to reflect the needs of the district student population. The district will also provide translation, if needed, during parent meetings and programs. Section 1116 (e)(5)

## A Parent's Right To Know

As a parent or guardian of a student at a Title I campus, you have the right to know the professional qualifications of the classroom teachers who instruct your child. Federal law allows you to ask for certain information about your child's classroom teachers, and requires the District to give you this information in a timely manner if you ask for it. Specifically, you have the right to ask for the following information about each child's classroom teachers:

• Whether the State Board for Educator Certification (SBEC) has licensed or qualified the teacher for the grades and subjects he or she teaches.

• Whether the State Board of Educator Certification (SBEC) has decided that the teacher can teach in a classroom without being licensed or qualified under state regulation because of special circumstances.

• The teacher's college major, whether the teacher has any advanced degrees and, if so, the subject of the degrees.

• Whether the teachers' aides or similar paraprofessionals provide services to your child and, if they do, their qualifications.

• Information on the level of achievement of the parent's child in each of the State academic assessments as required under Section 1111 (h)(6)(B)(i).

• Timely notice that the parent's child has been assigned to, or has been taught for four or more consecutive weeks, by at teacher who is not highly qualified under Section 1111 (h)(6)(B)(ii).
